

Argumentative Essay Outline AP Lang

I. Introduction

- A. Hook: Start with a captivating sentence to draw readers in and set the tone for your essay.
- B. Background Information: Provide context about the topic of your argumentative essay so that the reader can understand why it is important and engaging.
- C. Thesis Statement: State your opinion on the topic and how you will support your opinion throughout the essay.

II. Body Paragraph 1

- A. Topic Sentence: Introduce the first main point of your argument and explain why it is important and relevant to your thesis statement.
- B. Supporting evidence: Provide facts, statistics, quotes or examples that demonstrate why this main point is valid and important.

C. Analysis: Evaluate how well the evidence supports your main point and whether there are any flaws in the reasoning.

IV. Body Paragraph 3

A. Topic Sentence: Introduce the third main point of your argument and explain why it is important and relevant to your thesis statement.

B. Supporting evidence: Provide facts, statistics, quotes or examples that demonstrate why this main point is valid and important.

C. Analysis: Evaluate how well the evidence supports your main point and whether there are any flaws in the reasoning.

V. Conclusion

A. Summarize: Briefly summarize the main points of your argument and how they support your thesis statement.

B. Reflection: Reflect on the importance of this argument for readers, as well as its implications for the future.

C. Call to Action/Closing Statement: End your essay with a call to action or an inspiring closing statement.
