

Informational Expository Essay Outline

I. Introduction

- A. Hook: Begin with a striking fact, anecdote, or question related to your topic to grab the reader's attention.
- B. Background Information: Provide some context about the topic and explain why it is significant or relevant.
- C. Thesis Statement: State the main focus or purpose of your essay. What is the key information you will be presenting?

II. Body Paragraphs

A. First Main Point

- 1. Topic Sentence: Introduce the first key aspect or subtopic related to your thesis.
- 2. Supporting Evidence: Present factual information, statistics, or examples that support the topic sentence.
- 3. Explanation: Explain how the evidence or examples are relevant to the overall thesis and why they matter.

B. Second Main Point

III. Counterargument (if necessary)

- A. Present Opposing Viewpoint: If there are opposing views on the topic, briefly introduce them.

IV. Conclusion

- A. Restate the Thesis: Reiterate your thesis statement to remind the reader of the main focus.
- B. Summarize Key Points: Provide a concise summary of the main points discussed in the body paragraphs.
- C. Concluding Statement or Call to Action: End with a thought-provoking statement, a recommendation for further research, or a call to action related to the topic.
