

Research Proposal Format Template

1. Title Page (1 Page)

The title page presents the basic details of your research proposal.

Include:

- Research proposal title
 - Student's name
 - Institution name
 - Course name
 - Instructor's name
 - Submission date

2. Abstract (150–300 Words) (*Required for PhD or Grant Proposals*)

The abstract provides a brief summary of the entire proposal.

Include:

- Research problem
 - Main objective of the study
 - Methodology to be used
 - Expected outcomes or significance

3. Introduction (300–500 Words)

The introduction explains the background of the study and why the research is important.

Include:

- Background of the topic
- Problem statement
- Research objectives
- Research questions or hypothesis
- Significance of the study

4. Literature Review (400–700 Words)

This section reviews previous research related to your topic.

Include:

- Key theories and concepts
 - Summary of relevant studies
 - Research gaps in existing literature
 - How your research contributes to the field

5. Research Methodology (400–600 Words)

This section explains **how the research will be conducted**.

Include:

- Research design (qualitative, quantitative, or mixed methods)
 - Data collection methods (surveys, interviews, experiments, etc.)
 - Sampling method and participants
 - Data analysis techniques
 - Ethical considerations

6. Expected Outcomes (150–250 Words)

This section describes the **possible results and contributions** of the research.

Include:

- Expected findings
 - Potential impact of the research
 - Contribution to academic knowledge or real-world applications

7. Timeline (100–200 Words) (*Usually Required*)

This section outlines the **schedule for completing the research project**.

Example:

Research Stage	Time Frame
Topic selection	Week 1
Literature review	Weeks 2–3
Data collection	Weeks 4–5
Data analysis	Week 6
Final report writing	Weeks 7–8

8. Budget (100–200 Words) (*Only for Grant Proposals*)

This section explains the **estimated costs required for the research**.

Possible expenses include:

- Data collection tools
 - Software or equipment
 - Travel costs
 - Printing and materials

9. References (Varies)

List all sources cited in the proposal using the required citation style (APA, MLA, Chicago, etc.).

Example (APA):

Smith, J. (2022). *Social media and youth behavior*. *Journal of Social Research*, 15(2), 45–60.

This format works well for:

- Undergraduate research proposals
- Master's proposals
- Early PhD proposals (with longer sections)
